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An Accessible Christmas

Christmas brings many visitors into our Churches

22% of UK population are disabled in some way

Think ahead and talk to people

Anticipate and plan

Create opportunities

Offer a good welcome

Make your services representative

- Include people who represent the diversity of your congregation as readers, leaders etc
- Remember that this includes disabled people
- Support people to contribute in their own way
- Include plenty of traditional Christmas Carols and Bible readings
- This will help people with dementia and other memory issues to participate

- Things that can help
 - Fidget toys
 - Dark glasses
 - Over the counter reading glasses
 - Noise cancelling headphones
 - Adult and children's colouring and crayons

Communications

- Create an accessibility area on your website
- Include descriptions and pictures
 - The path and entrance
 - Step free access
 - Accessible toilet
 - Hearing loop

- Be honest about shortcomings
- Describe what will happen in your services
 - Carols, choir, candlelight, prayers etc
 - How long will it be?
- What will happen afterwards?

Outside

- Check your external lighting
- Replace blown and faulty bulbs
- Clear away trip hazards
- Sweep steps, paths and ramps
- Have 2 people on duty outside to welcome and assist

Accessible toilet

- Indicate where it is with clear signage
- Check it is clear of stored and unnecessary items
- Check the lighting is adequate for easy use
- Check the catch is easy to operate locking and unlocking
- Check the bin(s) are not obstructing access to the toilet
- Check baby changing facilities are not an obstruction or hazard
- Check taps deliver warm water that is not too hot

- Fill up soap and provide hand towels as well as a hand-dryer
- Check the emergency alarm is working and the chord reaches to just above the floor
- Have a protocol in place for what to do if the alarm is activated
- Who knows how to open the door?
- Where are any tools etc needed for this kept?
- Is there a first aider who can offer assistance?

Other toilets

- Clear out clutter and unnecessary items
- Check they are well lit
- Check taps and hand dryers are working
- Check door catches are easy to operate locking and unlocking

Lighting and visibility

If your service is by candlelight

- Have some wind-up torches for those who need more light
- Be aware that candlelight can be dazzling and disorientating for some people
- Keep the lights on until the start of the service
- Put the lights on at the end of the service

Decorations

- If you have lit Christmas trees and decorations
- Make sure these are not in sight lines between congregation and leaders/preachers
- Or just behind leaders/preachers
- Do not have flashing lights

Visibility during the service

- Make sure leaders and preachers are lit
- Have good lighting on faces to facilitate lip reading
- Leaders and preacher should keep still as well
- Do not preach from a pulpit as this makes lip reading impossible

Hearing

- Test your loop if you have one
- Ask a hearing aid user to test it
- Or buy a loop listener device
- Work out if there are places where your loop works better than others
- Using a lectern mic or over-ear mic gives best hearing loop results
- Don't use a clip-on mic
- Tell people you have a hearing loop and where it works best

Sitting, standing and kneeling

- Announce at the beginning that it is okay to do what is most comfortable during the service
- Make inclusive announcements
- 'As we sing this carol, you are invited to stand if you would like to or remain seated if this is best for you'

Service sheets and hymn books

- Publish the order of service, liturgy and hymn/song words online at least 48 hours before the service.
- Those who need to can make their own accessible copy – Braille, audio etc
- Others can download and display on a phone or tablet
- BSL interpreters can prepare their translation
- People who need or prefer to know what is going to happen can familiarise themselves with the service

- Provide large print copies of the service - 18 or 20 point font on cream paper
- If you use a screen, make sure the text is big enough and the contrast good
- Provide large print hardcopies for those who cannot see the screen
- Make your service sheet Dyslexia friendly
 - Use a Sans Serif font
 - Use 1.15-1.5 line spacing
 - Keep the layout simple and uncluttered

Sign Language

- There are 85,000 British Sign Language users in the UK
- There will be Deaf families and a Deaf community near you
- Include BSL interpretation in at least one of your services
- Or make sure a few services have interpretation in your deanery
- Make sure you advertise this well
- Use at least one Makaton signed carol during the service
- Makaton is used by many children with additional needs

Chairs and pews

- If you put out extra chairs, make sure aisles are still wide enough for wheelchairs
- Check you are not forcing wheelchairs or those using walking aids into areas where the floor is uneven or there are steps
- Provide some extra cushions for your pews so those who need it can have a cushion to sit on and/or behind them
- If you use chairs, make sure some of these have arms
- Clear some space for wheelchair users but be flexible, give people the choice to sit where they would like to
- Be prepared to welcome guide dogs and other assistance dogs
 - Rugs, bowls, room

Emergencies

- Make sure you have an evacuation plan that includes disabled people
- Brief your fire wardens
- Have water and sand available for emergencies
- If people hold their candles, make an announcement about being careful of people in front and safety for children

Quiet space

- Create a quiet space at the back or adjacent to the Church
- Offer adult colouring, fidget toys etc
- Make an announcement that gives people permission to leave the service for a while if they would like to
